Change of Name

In view of the fact that the present name of the Society is inconveniently long and does not fully express the character of the work now being carried on by the Society, and that it is desirable to adopt a name which will express to Seamen the work in which the Society is engaged, it was voted at a meeting of the Board of Managers held on December 12th, 1905, to make application to the New York Supreme Court for an order authorizing the Society to change its name to "Seamen's Church Institute of New York."

On February 23d, 1906, an order to that effect was made by the Hon. James Fitzgerald, Justice of the Supreme Court, and on and after April 5th, 1906, the Society will assume and be known by its new name, viz.,

Report of the Board of Managers.

The Field. Our headquarters have been maintained in New York for sixty-one years, but our field has become world-wide ; out of the three million sailors toiling on the seven seas, at least 250,000 frequent this port every year. In outgoing ships they visit every port and carry with them the good and evil influences they assimilate here. If our mercantile marine is greatly developed, our Society, like our nation, will become a world power. While Russian seamen have mutinied, British seamen have proved loyal to their flag, owing to better treatment. Shall we not profit by their example ?

The Work. Details of our local work may be found in the general summary and in the synopsis of station reports, and will show a satisfactory growth on all the lines adopted and adapted. The aggregate results will be known only when the sea gives up its dead. Our aim is first to give religious privileges, then rational entertainment and attractive environment to all seamen while on shore ; police and social protection from the evils that beset them ; prompt collection of wages due them, and punishment for those who abuse them.

To accomplish these objects our chaplains preach plainly, personally, and conversationally. We furnish six reading rooms with ample facilities for home correspondence and for transmission of earnings to dependent relatives ; concerts and lectures adapted to the needs of a floating population temporarily on shore, and cultivate personal and friendly relations with the 7,474 men who have attended our entertainments, and with the 19,355 who have been present at one or more of our 407 religious services.

We realize that in the short average of a sailor's active life (said not to exceed twelve years) and in their short stay on shore, our officers and employees, in their ministrations, must be alert, sympathetic and untiring ; and we are glad to report increasing usefulness at the ten stations of the Society enumerated upon another page.

Legal Aid. Our sister organization, the Legal Aid Society, through its Seamen's Branch, at 28 Whitehall Street, has taken appropriate action on about 3,000 applications for relief, including 422 men sent by this Society, in collecting unpaid wages, damages for cruel treatment, and in the general enforcement of laws for the protection of seamen.

The sum of \$95,161.23 has been received on deposit from seamen this year for safekeeping or for transmission to their homes and relatives. We find from correspondence that maintaining the home interests of men and treating the home as the unit is yearly productive of increasing good to men and to the families dependent upon them.

**Mission
Boat
and
Harbor
Service.**

The "Sentinel" has added greatly to the efficiency of our mission and practical work in the churchless harbor and has become indispensable in the recent enlargement of our scope by its visits to 120 ships and its transportation of an average of 175 men each month. The continued co-operation of the ladies who constitute the Seamen's Benefit Society in keeping this vessel in active work is gratefully acknowledged. Its average monthly cost for maintenance is about \$355, or \$4,260 per annum, but its value is vastly greater. Of this sum we have received \$1,650 from the said society.

**Our Free
Shipping
Bureau.**

Although we have not procured the hoped for establishment of a national free shipping bureau, the increasing number of seamen shipped (1,453 in 1905) at our stations without payment of illegal shipping fees and bonuses furnishes cumulative proof to men and shipowners alike that their interests are greatly promoted by our Society. Men have enjoyed the hospitality of our religious services, reading room, lunch counter, baggage rooms, and shipping facilities. The protection thus extended has reduced to a minimum the evils of the crimps and criminal boarding house keepers, many of whom have abandoned their vile traffic in human flesh and have gone into other business. The opportunity to find men among the 166,048 who visit our reading rooms and most of whom desire shipment is gladly availed of by a rapidly increasing number of captains seeking for crews. The exacting requirements of our free shipping bureau and ticket office and baggage rooms have required the opening of a central office at No. 1 State Street for Chaplain Mansfield.

**Home
for
Seamen.**

Although our Sailors' Home at 52 Market Street has been greatly improved in every respect under its present management and 992 seamen have been cared for this year, we are still limited to accommodations for 41 men. We need a larger and better equipped Home or "Institute" in a more central location near South Street and the Battery, which can receive and care for at the same time at least 250 men. It should have a large auditorium, entertainment rooms suited to seamen and to their officers, and other modern conveniences to put New York upon a level with Montreal, Boston, Liverpool and other

ports, and we again recommend that this Society should at once begin a citizens' movement for the early establishment of such a home. We believe that the merchants of New York will respond generously to your invitation to contribute to an object so humane, so patriotic and so well adapted to the status of this port, when its needs are clearly brought to their attention. A suitable location has already been secured. It remains for our citizens to provide an ample building fund. There are now 69 licensed sailor boarding houses in New York and Brooklyn. They accommodate about 1,000 men; their keepers are mostly foreigners and six of them are women; all are subject to sanitary and police inspection; 4 houses have recently been condemned and closed; others have made required changes.

Church Action. In addition to the appointment by the General Convention of a joint commission composed of Bishops, Presbyters and laymen to promote concerted action in behalf of seamen throughout the nation, we are glad to note that the Diocesan Convention has this year appointed a committee to devise means for the erection of an adequate building for carrying on our work in New York. Your board is greatly encouraged and looks forward to a year of increased activity. We earnestly believe that what we are doing is thoroughly worth while and worth doing well.

Legislation. The bills introduced in the last Congress for the improvement of our mercantile marine failed to reach a vote and the subject has already been taken up anew at the present session. Many schemes for the renewal of our mercantile prestige on the seas and in the harbors of the world are now under consideration by the appropriate committees in the Senate and House of Representatives. Our committee on legislation will attend at Washington to watch these proceedings, whether for subsidies, free purchase of ships or other methods, with a view to promote the better protection of seamen who frequent American ports. It will also give attention to the United States weather signal service, the life saving service and the lighthouse service, all for the benefit of seaman entering and leaving this and other ports, and endeavor to prevent or punish "shanghaiing" and other crimes against seaman.

In Memoriam. Death has again diminished our number. The late R. S. Holt, who co-operated with the Society since 1879 as lay manager or vice-president, and the late James Pott, since 1892 as lay manager, have ceased from their labors. We mourn their loss and sadly add their names to those of managers who have died in the harness, a list of whom is attached to this report.

Legacies. The only legacy left to our Society since the last annual report is one for \$100, under the will of Frances Augusta Ludlum, who died in June, 1905.

Finances. This year we have expended in the most economical manner, \$31,188.04 in carrying on the work of the Society. Our receipts for current expenses were only \$18,563.79, thus compelling us to draw largely from our trust funds the additional amount of this year's deficit, viz., \$12,624.25. All departments of the Society's work are supervised by committees of the board and their accounts are carefully scrutinized and duly audited.

Appeal. Curtailment of effort in the face of the urgent demands of our increasing work seems inadvisable and impossible unless we shirk our great and growing opportunity for usefulness. We are still far behind other large cities in their care for seamen, and if we are not sustained we must place the responsibility upon the opulent commercial, maritime and civic interests of this magnificent port, which leads the world in its generous and humane interest in men who labor and suffer on land. We cannot believe that they will knowingly continue to neglect those who toil and ultimately perish on the sea.

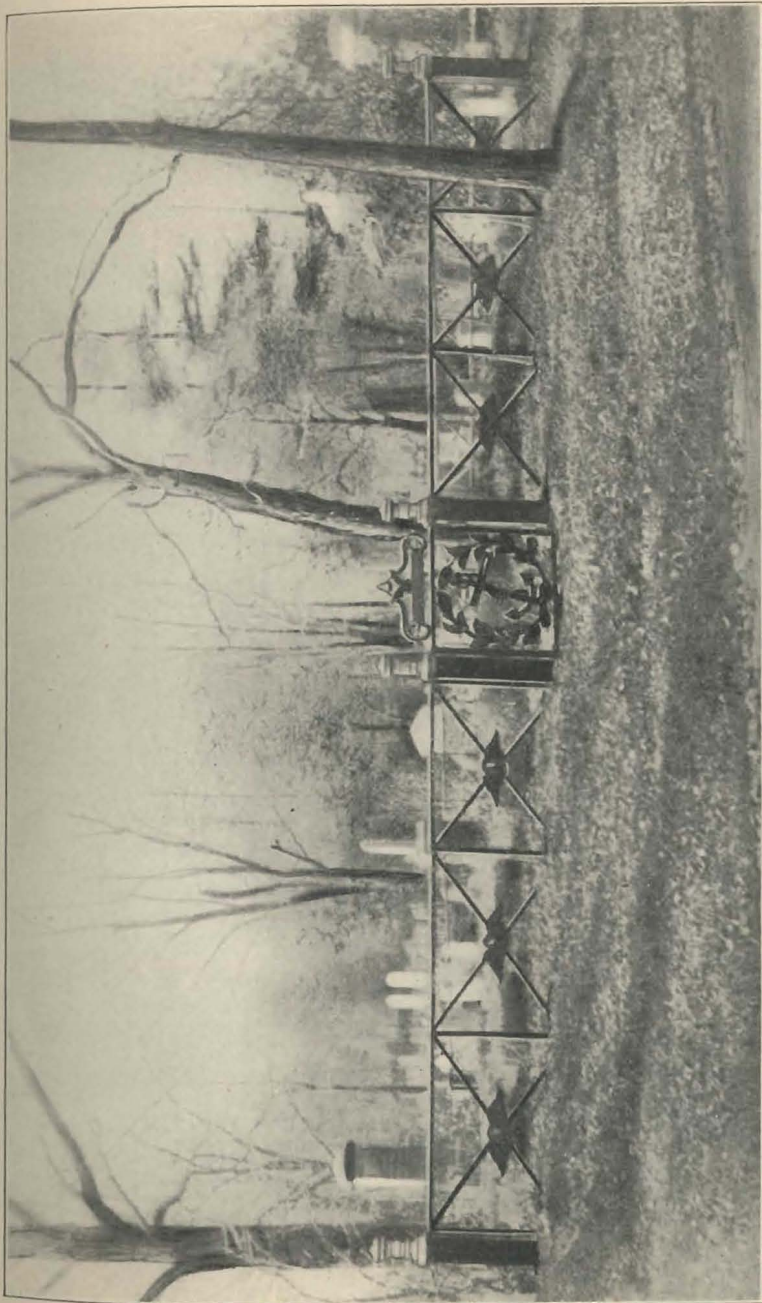

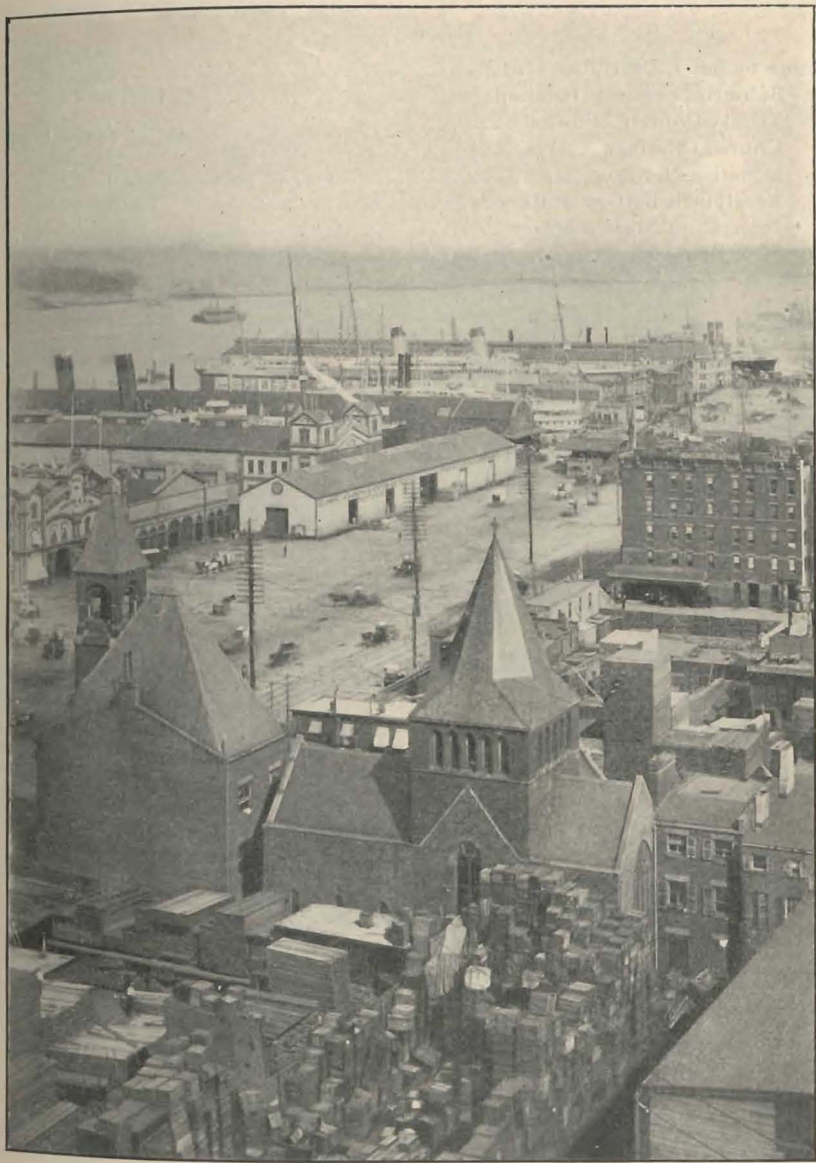


LOT OF THE "INSTITUTE," EVERGREEN CEMETERY, BROOKLYN.

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Annual Report of the Seamen's Benefit Society.

The Seamen's Benefit Society is very glad to again report a successful year of good work. The list of active and associate members has grown encouragingly long, and considerable interest aroused for the cause of the sailor.

Seven regular business meetings have been held, and a parlor meeting at the residence of Mrs. de Peyster, at which Mr. Mansfield gave an illustrated lecture upon the work of the mission yacht "Sentinel."

The Sunday evening teas for the apprentice boys have been continued; this is a very important branch of the work, and one which grows steadily. These apprentice boys have the same position in the British Merchant Marine as the midshipmen in the Royal Navy.

The coffee bar at No. 1 State Street has been maintained by the Society, and has done good service in keeping sailors out of the many saloons which infest our city.

The Society has provided a pianist for Wednesday evenings, and a pianist and refreshments for the Saturday social evenings at the Mission, No. 34 Pike Street.

Sailors' helmets, wristlets, mufflers, books, magazines, etc., have been sent to the Chaplain by the Society and its friends.

A fair was held on December 2nd, 1904, at the residence of Mrs. Daniel Stimson, for the benefit of the Society. Italian peasant potteries, books signed by their authors, and a large table of dolls, beautifully dressed in different national costumes, were sold. The fair was a great success, and netted one thousand two hundred dollars (\$1,200).

In looking back upon the work—the very energetic work—of the past year, for the helping and befriending of the homeless, friendless sailor—foreign and native born—the "Seamen's Benefit Society" feels enthusiastic to go on.

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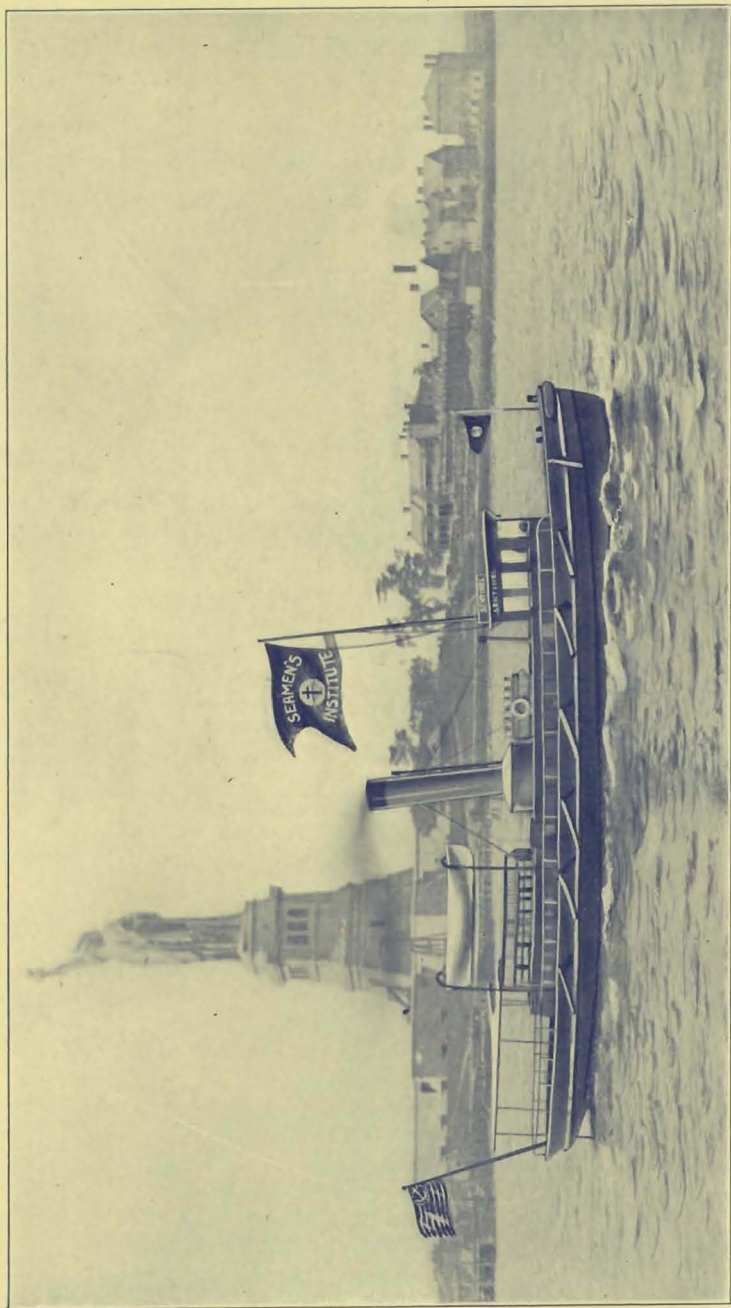
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
