

Report of the Board of Managers.

THE MANAGERS have much satisfaction in the Report they present this year, and hope that the results will give pleasure to the Society.

For the past two or three years the work among the sailors has steadily extended. In calling attention to the figures recording the growing usefulness of the Reading Rooms, and increased attendance at Services, your Board looks for further gains during the coming year. The time is ripe for the work. The sailors like the quarters we provide for them, and respond to our methods of instruction and entertainment by increasing attendance at our meetings, and when they sail away, send back new friends whom they have told about us.

Each station has its characteristic set of seamen. The sailing craft frequent the East River. No. 34 Pike Street, with the Floating Bethel, attract the men who man them. The canal boatmen and their families are the peculiar charge of the Coenties Slip Station, and the great steamship lines contribute their quota to the Houston Street Mission. The figures for all stations this year and last are as follows:





Report of the Missionary

IN CHARGE OF THE

"Floating Church of our Saviour."

There are many things which should be mentioned in our Annual Report. I will call your attention as briefly as possible to some of them.

The services have been well attended, both at the "Floating Church" and also at the Lecture Room. All show a marked growth. The Bible Class meetings on Tuesday nights, and Hope Club for Seamen, a social club, every Saturday night, have gradually grown in numbers and interest. The attendance at the Reading Room at 34 Pike St. is indeed phenomenal, and is a great source of blessing to the seamen; for if we get them to the Reading Room, which is our aim, we generally draw them to the Lecture Room and the Church.

The Boarding Houses are regularly visited, and much time is spent seeking new arrivals among the seamen, and making known our "Safe Retreat" in Pike Street.

I have spent considerable time, as Capt. Luce, Agent for Snug Harbor, knows, in helping infirm and friendless sailors to the Harbor's quiet repose. One seaman came here without any records, and I was eleven months getting his papers all right, so that he might enter. Quite a number I have sent to St. Luke's Hospital and other places for treatment, and some we have helped to find homes. Our Sunday School is going along quietly, doing good work under its superintendent, Mr. Benjamin Watson. Also, the Sewing School for children every Saturday morning, under the direction of Mrs. Montgomery.

I must return thanks to our many friends in aiding, financially and otherwise, to the success of our Annual Excursion.

I would draw the attention of our friends to a few pointed facts, which will bear reflection, in regard to our work and its recent growth.



Annual Report

OF THE

Missionary of Coenties Slip Station

Your Missionary in this, his Annual Report, acknowledges his thanks to God for the many mercies vouchsafed, and for the upholding grace accompanying him in his labors of visitation and ministrations of the Word and Sacraments during the past year.

The more regular and religious attendants upon the services of the Mission have observed and with pleasure remarked upon the increased number of the worshippers. The gathering of boatmen and seamen from all parts of the Harbor to the afternoon services has favorably impressed the people of the neighborhood with respect for our Church, and has evoked words of praise and esteem for the aims and operations of the Society. This is a gain for which much praise is effered.

The habits of life of the sea-faring population formed on the water, and their toils largely expended on that element, call for special provisions while on land, and as they are unable to build and equip churches and boarding houses for themselves, those whom God has prospered and endowed with means are bound, on the ground of the brotherhood of man and the injunctions of the Gospel, to supply them with those necessities which their moral and physical natures demand.

Seamen and boatmen on their arrival in the Harbor should be able to find a Christian church where they will be made welcome, and a Christian boarding-house where the sailors will not be fleeced of the fruit of their hazardous labors on the deep.

The writer has much satisfaction in being able to report to the Board of Managers that for the first time in the history of the Station, in harmony with a resolution of the Executive Committee, Holy Communion has been celebrated. This ordinance and the Saving Grace by Divine institution, conveyed to the worthy participants, must inure to the benefit of those receiving the same, and more firmly establish the influence of the Church in the neighborhood of the Mission. This means of Salvation will be regularly administered hereafter. The presence of many members of the Board at the first Celebration gave unfeigned joy to the Celebrant.
