A large number of sailors came to me for Books after the sermon. A gentleman present Mr. A. B. Valentine of 187 Henry St was anxious that each man should be presented with a Bible who wanted one.

Feb 9, 1851

Told him that we were so strictly enjoined
by the Committee of the Bible Society
to give them out with great circum-
spection and care that unless the
application was a strong one and the
need very apparent we usually felt
obliged to withhold them in our gratuitous
distribution. He then said he wished that
I would give ^{me to} every man there who
wanted and that he would pay for
them. I therefore did as he requested
and sent about 8 persons with Bibles,
I had given them to him in order that
he might write the names in of the
recipient in each together with his
own. I found he was a pious man
& most solemnly admonished each
that they received the gift from the alms
of God and hoped they would feel that

and remember that they did so,
He at the melting of about ^{the 15 or 18}
persons to whom I had given books
& of whom had received Bibles
from him by my hands, put into
my hands two dollars to pay for
Bibles.

At the commencement of the services there
was a vagrant sailor who had been
here before to church the last Sunday, ~~and~~
and who made some disturbance in speaking
to me aloud on leaving the house at the
middle of the services, now seated in the
front seat on the female side of the house
Leaving he wants again annoy the
congregation by his talking supposing
him again inquired requested Mr
E. S. Parker to have him put out
before we began. It was not done
in the hope he would keep silent.

He was evidently very restless & I was all
the while, true and during the sermon.
fearing annoyance from him. Paul
his son Mr. Duncan our Treasurer who
was present went and sat beside him
& kept him still. At the conclusion
of the giving out of the Books he came
to me evidently sober, and said I had
made a great impression on him by
my sermon. & that if I would help him
to a copy of the Temperance pledge he
would sign it on the spot. He did so in
the presence of Mr. Duncan & several
others, under the name of Marshall
Smith Rush. His ^{right} hand has been split
open by a wound & does not seem in
a fair way soon to heal. I hope for good from
this step. The impression made on his mind
by our services to day I am glad he was not put out

On Tuesday last July, 4, 1857 I received
Mr. Dickinson who communicated
to me the perversion of her eldest
daughter, an Xmas week last to

NEW YORK HISTORICAL SOCIETY.—The regular monthly meeting of this society was held on Tuesday evening, at its rooms in the New York University. The proceedings commenced by the secretary reading several letters and communications, of some historical interest. Several new members were then nominated, who were referred to the Executive Committee: after which, Rev. B. C. C. Parker, of the Floating Church of Our Saviour, read a paper on the shipping and navigation of New York. He commenced by describing the astounding increase of commerce throughout this country in general, and by comparing it with that of other countries. He then confined himself especially to the shipping and navigation of New York alone, in connection with which, he referred to her growing cotton trade—to the superiority of her sailing vessels in particular—of her packet ships and clippers, and to the extent of her steam navigation, at present. He then minutely related the first efforts of Mr. Fitch in his application of steam power to the propelling of vessels, his first experiment on the Collect Pond, in New York, together with a description of the first trips of Mr. Fulton, his successor, from New York to Albany. At the conclusion of the composition, it was moved and carried that the society return thanks to the Rev. B. C. C. Parker for his elaborate, instructive and interesting document; after which, the assembly dispersed. In consequence of the great pressure of interesting matter, we are prevented from giving a more lengthened report of the proceedings.
