PROCEEDINGS OF THE SOCIETY.

FORM OF BEQUEST.

I give and bequeath to the "Protestant Episcopal Church Missionary Society for Seamen, in the City and Port of New York," incorporated by the Legislature of the State of New York, in the year One Thousand Eight Hundred and Forty-four, the sum of Dollars, for the purposes of said Society.

THE Annual Meeting of the Society was held agreeable to the Constitution, on the evening of Easter Monday, the 1st of April, 1850, officers and managers elected; and the reports referred, as usual, to the Board of Managers for printing and circulation.

The Sixth Anniversary of the Protestant Episcopal Church Missionary Society for Seamen, in the City and Port of New York, was celebrated at St. Bartholomew's Church on Sunday evening, 14th April, 1850. Rev. Thos. H. Taylor, D. D., Second Vice President, presiding, assisted by the Rev. G. T. Bedell, Rev. Francis Vinton, D. D., Vice Presidents; Rev. B. C. C. Parker, and Rev. D. V. M. Johnson, Missionaries of the Society; several others of the Rev. Clergy being also present.

The Church Services were conducted by the Rev. Dr. Vinton; the Annual Report of the Board of Managers was read by Rev. Mr. Bedell; the sermon preached by Rev. Thos. M. Clark, of Boston, and a collection made for the benefit of the Mission.

REPORT.

The Board of Managers of the Protestant Episcopal Church Missionary Society for Seamen in the City and Port of New York, present their Sixth Annual Report.

Whilst reviewing the history of the past year with heartfelt gratitude to God, the Board of Managers congratulate the Society and its friends, upon its continued prosperity and success. We rejoice in its fast increasing influence, and its growth in the affections of all who have watched its progress; especially of those who are immediately affected by its efforts.

With cheerful, ready liberality never before equalled in our history, those to whom we look for sympathy and upon whom we depend for aid, have responded to our call, and left us but little to solicit. Moved, as we believe, by the Holy Spirit, they have availed themselves of opportunities which have been offered for contributing to this good cause, and thereby rendered the discharge of our responsibility more than usually pleasant, much lightening our burden of anxieties and cares.

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Through the divine blessing upon our exertions, we are enabled to omit, on this occasion, our usual account of pecuniary trials and embarrassments. Our obligations have been promptly met; and notwithstanding a somewhat increased expenditure for repairs and renovation of our Chapels, we now "owe no man anything but love."

We look confidently to those liberal friends who have placed us in this gratifying condition, to maintain us in it. We have no reliable income except the annual stipend of Six Hundred Dollars from Trinity Church, unless we may include (what ex. perience has however proved to be not always a certain source of income) a subscription list of nine hundred dollars, which having been anticipated, is not available until after October next. Yet we can rely with hopes better grounded than at any time before, upon friends who are both anxious to advance the Mission and confident of our success; friends more numerous than ever, whose prayers we believe are constantly presented in our behalf, and whose exertions are always at our service. By their help and God's gracious blessing we trust to do much in future towards converting "the abundance of the Sea," unto the Lord.

Your Board have been very much encouraged during the past year by evidences of the increasing interest, felt in our Mission by seamen who occupy high positions of influence, both in the Navy and in the Merchant Service. This evidence has been offered by gratifying communications to our Missonaries, and in some instances by large donations to our funds. We may well be confirmed in our opinion of the importance and usefulness of our Work, when those who are best capable of judging, thus pronounce a warm approval.

Our anticipations of large receipts from donations through the boxes lodged on board the Packet Ships, we regret to say have not been realized. Unforeseen difficulties have interfered with the success of this plan, and experience has taught your Board that the expedient is of doubtful policy for them. It will probably be abandoned.

We acknowledge with gratitude the continued liberality of the Protestant Episcopal Bible and Common Prayer Book Society; the Protestant Episcopal Tract Society, the Protestant Episcopal Sunday School Union; the New York Bible Society, and the American Tract Society. They have gratuitously furnished large supplies of Books and Tracts to our Missionaries, which with others, purchased by the contributions made for this purpose at the Chapels, have been freely distributed to Seamen and Boatmen. Three hundred and fifty thousand pages of religious instruction have thus been as seed sown in faith. "Cast upon the waters," we cannot expect often to see or hear of its results; yet we have been permitted, in some cases, to know that this instrumentality has proved a valuable auxiliary to the ministrations of the word. From remote and unexpected sources we have learned, that in several instances, the truth thus disseminated has been made the means of leading seamen to a knowledge of the Saviour. We might have anticipated such a re-

sult; we did indeed with a trembling faith expect it; but God in his goodness has not only given us an answer to our prayers, but also suffered us to see and rejoice in it: and with greater steadfastness and hopefulness we would persevere in employing this instrumentality. Your Board are anxious to enlarge the circulating religious Library belonging to the Chapel on the North River, and greatly desire to form one for the Chapel on the East River: they would take this opportunity to invite specific contributions towards these objects. It is intended that the books in these Libraries shall be constantly in circulation, being taken by Seamen and Boatmen on their voyages, and exchanged for others when they return.

Your Board again urge upon the attention of their friends the great importance, if not the necessity, of providing for the regular current expenses of the Mission by annual subscriptions. The plan they have heretofore proposed they cannot amend. It is to obtain five hundred Annual Subscribers, of the sum of Five Dollars each. Our exertions thus far have resulted only in obtaining one hundred and twenty-four at Five Dollars, one hundred and fifty-five at Two Dollars, and nine at One Dollar, or about one-third of the desirable and required amount, and the Board feel they cannot too urgently press upon the Episcopal Community of our City and Port their request, that the remainder of the subscription be promptly filled.

We cannot point to an array of figures in our statistics of results which will satisfy the querulous, or convince the doubting; but we can show by these that God has graciously approved and blessed the labors of our earnest, true hearted, indefatigable Missionaries. The result is sufficient to satisfy reasonable expectation, and to justify our still confident faith. The very character of our Mission—the constant migration of its subjects—forbids us to aocumulate such statistics as are the evidences of success in permanent Parishes.

Our Missionaries report 70 Baptisms, 27 Confirmations, added to the Communion 36, and number of Communicants now 135. The average attendance at the services is about 200, and probably 5000 Sailors worship in our Chapels annually. This is indeed a small number out of the 50,000 who annually visit this Port, some 5,000 being always on shore. Yet we must consider the peculiar situation in which a seaman finds himself on landing in our City; and for the elements of such an estimate we must take not only our knowledge of his natural predisposition to evil, (a tendency against which all of us equally with himself are compelled to contend,) but also a consideration of the peculiar temptations amidst which he is placed, and the very erroneous treatment which in general he receives from the Christian Community. He is usually deemed to be out of the pale of society, one who has no sympathies in common with landsmen, and therefore little sympathy is extended towards him, and little interest excited in his behalf.

Generally his education has been neglected, and

by the necessity of his case he knows little of the craft and plausible selfishness of those whose wicked self-interest makes him their prey. In all his joys and sorrows, he is compelled to seek sympathy among his mates, or is thrown into the evil companionship of such as, for sinister ends, pretend to be his friends. Is it then to be wondered at, that his associations are seldom with those who esteem and love the virtues of purity, sobriety, economy, and a godly conversation; or is it strange that he prefers to wile away the leisure hours of the Sabbath in idle jesting, or profane mirth, desecrating this sacred day in the open and inviting places of public resort, or lounging idly upon the piers.

We cannot be surprised at the smallness of the number of Sailors and Boatmen who frequent our Chapels. When we view the obstacles to be surmounted, we are filled with joy that so many persevere in the use of these means of Grace. The contemplation excites us to active exertion for the multitude who remain unblessed. The visiting committees detailed every month, in part for this purpose, strive to draw the attention of Seamen to the Chapels, or if they may not lead them to the ministrations of the Gospel, to leave with them messages of divine truth in Books and Tracts. This instrumentality has been greatly blessed; and in several instances which have been reported, has resulted as we believe, in a saving faith in Christ and a permanent attachment to the excellent "old paths" of our Church.

Your Board would be very unwilling that the Christian Community of our City should consider its duty to Seamen accomplished even if our plans were fully in operation and completely successful; a strenuous effort should be made to carry into effect the plan suggested through a former annual report, by our Missionary, the Rev. Mr. Johnson. Another "Home for Seamen" should be provided. That on the East side of the City has greatly contributed to improve the moral condition of Sailors, who within its walls find a shelter from temptation, and the sympathy and associations of christian friends. We need such an institution on the shores of the North River, to be in immediate connection with our own labors, and under the immediate supervision and influence of our own missionaries; it should perform the like benevolent offices for the multitude of Seamen and Boatmen who throng this portion of our City: and it should be rendered attractive by a good Library, by Lectures, by a Sabbath School and by social comforts. Surely christian love will not neglect so prominent a means of withdrawing Seamen from the influence of those temptations which are so dangerous and fascinating in their circumstances, nor refuse to furnish that which, so far as the Board can see, is the only instrumentality now wanting, to elevate them to the social condition they ought to occupy.

We have thus laid before you, our friends, the brief history of our year's labors. We have presented the ground of our hopes and our encouragements, our

few disappointments and our earnest expectations. We have furnished food for thought, to those who may be willing to reflect upon their own responsibility to the neglected class for whom we labor; and we have laid open a field for active exertion to those who, by Divine blessing may be inclined to make their good wishes the seeds of good works. We have also communicated the results which have appeared in our labors for the year. Though few, they are abundantly encouraging, and certainly are sufficient to justify us in expecting your co-operation.

We have faith in our work; and therefore by divine aid we mean to pursue it with a will. We have faith in Him who by his Providence has given us this work to do; and therefore we follow it up, with cheerful, hopeful, heartiness. We only ask that you will be liberal of your efforts, your gifts, and your prayers; we shall not then work in vain in the Lord.

REPORT

OF THE MISSIONARY IN CHARGE OF THE FLOATING CHURCH OF "OUR SAVIOUR," MOORED AT FOOT OF PIKE STREET, EAST RIVER.

IN making his Sixth Annual Report to the Board of Managers, the Missionary in charge of the Floating Church of "Our Saviour," desires devoutly to acknowledge his gratitude to the great head of the Church for his continued blessing. In no previous year have been presented so many gratifying evidences of the usefulness of the mission, or of God's gracious favor towards it. Its influence upon the seamen of our foreign shipping, has been continually growing more important, and the sphere of its operations constantly enlarging.

Your Missionary continues to be visited at his residence by those upon whose hearts religious impressions—from the preaching of God's word in that house of prayer—have been made; others come to him for religious instruction and the ordinances of the Church, whose attention has been arrested, while in a course of sin, by the books he has given them, which they have read at sea, and who have been led seriously to think on their ways. Not seldom has the tear of deep contrition in these interviews, been seen to flow; often the stubborn heart has been made to bow before the Majesty of divine truth; while reasoning upon righteousness, temperance, and judgment to come, the awakened have trembled in view of their sins, and asked, "what must I do to be saved ?"

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The very large number of religious books, which, through the liberality of Christian friends, your Missionary has been enabled to put into the hands of sailors bound to sea, have been constantly doing their silent work in their hearts.

The letters he has often received from sailors, acknowledging with gratitude, the good they have done to their souls; the strength they have added to their faith; the confidence with which they have inspired their hearts in the hour of trial; the firmness they have imparted to their resolutions to turn unto God, and the support they have afforded their sinking spirits in the hour of darkness and fear, would, if they were all collected, present a picture, whose groups would be living and speaking witnesses of the usefulness of the Society's labor, more animating, because more eloquent and truthful, than any other assurance they could receive.

He has put into their hands during the last year, besides Bibles, Testaments, and Prayer Books, over 2,100 bound volumes of religious books, with more than 41,000 pages of religious tracts. The bread has been literally cast upon the waters, and in fulfilment of the promise, it shall be found after many days, there are evidences sufficient to confirm our faith, and animate our hearts in the holy labor in which we are engaged.

During the past year, your Missionary has solemnized twenty-one marriages; baptized, fifty-three persons (children and adults;) attended seventeen funerals; presented twentyfour persons for confirmation, and received fourteen more, not including these, to the Holy Communion.

He desires gratefully to acknowledge very liberal donations of Bibles from the "New York Bible Society," and Bibles and large donations of Prayer Books from the "New York Bible and Common Prayer Book Society," Tracts and Books from the "American Tract Society," and the "Protestant Episcopal Tract Society," and publications given to eabin boys, from the "Protestant Episcopal Sunday School Union," besides books from other sources, which have been kindly supplied him. All of which are now doing their important work on hearts on the deep.

REPORT

OF THE MISSIONARY IN CHARGE OF THE FLOATING CHURCH OF THE "HOLY COMFORTER," FOOT OF DEY STREET, N. Y.

I have a class of pupils numbering twenty-eight, which I regularly meet at half-past 9 o'clock on the morning of every Lord's Day for instruction. In this work I am assisted by two members of the congregation. Some of these are the children of boatmen, wintering here, and of seamen. A number of candidates, sixteen, are preparing for Confirmation, which I expect will be administered during this visitation of the Bishop. Among them are three seamen. There are several others, now far away upon the ocean, or on some distant shore, with whom your Missionary has had interesting conversation, who received their serious impressions at the Chapel, and promised that they would make diligent preparation for this holy rite, the blessing of which they will be glad to receive when an opportunity offers.

One of the seamen to be Confirmed, received books and parting counsel from your Missionary, more than two years ago, just as he was leaving port, on a whaling voyage. He returned in one year, and has been regularly at the Church, whenever he has been in port. I have distributed about 275 Bibles, 250 Prayer Books, 56,000 pages of Tracts, and about 300 volumes of other suitable religious books.

The services upon the Lord's Day, and the holy days of the Church, have been regularly observed, as mentioned in last year's Report, and the attendance upon them has not only been larger, but the devotion and reverence of all, have been both gratifying and encouraging.

Under the blessing of Almighty God, the Mission seems to be doing its work slowly, amid its unpropitious circumstances. It is a work of faith and patience, and we shall not see the blessed fruits of it until the developments of Eternity shall disclose the glories and perfection of the Church triumphant.
