I give and bequeath to "The Protestant Episcopal Church Missionary Society for Seamen in the City and Port of New-York," incorporated by the Legislature of the State of New-York, in the year One Thousand Eight Hundred and Forty-four, the sum of Dollars, for the purposes of said Society.

PROCEEDINGS OF THE SOCIETY.

THE ANNUAL MEETING was held on Easter Monday, April 13th, 1857; at which time the Reports of the Board of Managers, the Missionaries and the Treasurer were presented, and the Officers of the Society for the ensuing year were elected.

THE THIRTEENTH ANNIVERSARY OF THE MISSION WAS celebrated at the Church of the Ascension, Fifth Avenue, on Sunday evening, April 26th, 1857. The Rt. Rev. Horatio Potter, D. D., President, presided, assisted by Rev. William Berrian, D. D., Rev. Thomas H. Taylor, D. D., Rev. G. T. Bedell, D. D., and Rev. S. Cooke, Vice-Presidents. The services were conducted by the Rev. Messrs. B. C. C. Parker and J. M. Waite, Missionaries of the Society. The Report of the Board of Managers was read by Henry Fisher, Esq. ; a Sermon was preached by the Rev. William F. Morgan, Rector of St. Thomas' Church, New-York City, and a collection made in aid of the funds of the Society.

THIRTEENTH ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE

BOARD OF MANAGERS

OF THE

Protestant Episcopal Church MISSIONARY SOCIETY FOR SEAMEN, IN THE CITY AND PORT OF NEW-YORK. PRESENTED AT THE ANNUAL MEETING, MARCH 13, 1857.

The Board of Managers of the Protestant Episcopal Church Missionary Society for Seamen, in the city and port of New-York, in presenting their thirteenth Annual Report, would thankfully acknowledge the continued mercy of the great Head of the Church in blessing their labors during the past year. They have not to mourn the loss of any member of their Board, or to report any hindrance in their work, and thus have renewed cause to put their trust in Him who has hitherto been their confidence and their strength.

Twelve years since, when we presented our first Annual Report, it told of but one Missionary and one Chapel. Now we gratefully report the labors of three Missionaries, with three stations for preaching the Gospel, and a *Sailors' Home*. Our work has been uninterrupted, and we hope not without fruits. The progress of this Mission, and its results, encourage us to renewed efforts for the spiritual and temporal welfare of that class of our fellow-men for whose benefit it is especially designed.

The reports of our three faithful Missionaries give evidence that their labors have not been without reward. They have held divine service regularly twice on every Lord's day in each of the Chapels, and, with the exception of a few weeks vacation during the heat of the summer, and a short interruption from the severity of the winter, twice, likewise, by the Missionary at Large, in the open air at Coenties Slip. The attendance at all the stations has been fair in numbers, and giving us reason to hope that "good seed has been sown, to bring forth fruit in due season." Our work, however, is eminently one of faith, as from the constant change of the attendance on our services, the fruits of this Mission can only be known on the great day when "the secrets of all hearts shall be revealed."

By the liberal contributions of the churches, and individual subscribers and donors, as well as the bequests of departed friends, we have been enabled thus far to meet the demands upon our treasury; but the coming year brings with it the necessity for a *greater* expenditure, and consequent appeal to the *enlarged* liberality of the friends of the seamen. Owing to the enhanced cost of the necessaries and comforts of life, the salaries of our Missionaries have been increased one-third; and as we have now rented a room in Coenties Slip, in connection with our services in that quarter, to prevent any interruption from the inclemency of the weather, as well as to afford greater facility in distributing books and conversing with the seamen, an additional expense has been thus incurred.

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Our late Missionary, Rev. D. V. M. Johnson, having resigned his charge in connection with this Society in December, 1855, as mentioned in our last report, the services of the Floating Church of the Holy Comforter, in the North River, were supplied by various clergymen until the 20th July last. The Board, in June, unanimously elected Rev. Joseph M. Waite as the Missionary for this station ; and his nomination having been approved of by the Bishop, he entered on his duties on Sunday, 20th July. The report of his labors since that period will manifest his faithfulness and peculiar fitness for this station.

The Floating Church of our Saviour, at the foot of Pike-street, East River, under the charge of the Rev. B. C. C. Parker, has been open for divine service twice on every Lord's day during the past year, a third service having been added during the season of Lent. The average attendance at this Church has been about 110, one-third of them being seafaring men. During the past year, at this Church, there have been baptized sixty-seven persons, married twenty-one couples, funerals eleven, nine persons have been admitted to the communion. To seamen about leaving the port there have been distributed 105 Bibles, 165 Testaments, 108 Prayer-Books, 1,400 miscellaneous religious books and 2,300 pages of Tracts. The bulkhead, occupied by this Church, having been ordered to be sold by the executors of the estate to which it belonged, and no other location in that vicinity being found, the Board was compelled to purchase this water-right, at an expense of some \$5,000. The means of completing this purchase were derived from a bequest by the late Captain Samuel M. Thompson, of this city, thus constituting it an appropriate and abiding monument of the piety of a sailor who knew the spiritual wants of his fellow-seamen.

The Church of the Holy Comforter, on the North River.—Fears were expressed in our last report that we should be compelled to remove this Church from the foot of Dey-street to another location. After fruitless efforts to obtain a more eligible berth, it was removed, on the first of May last, to the foot of Laight-street, at an additional expense, in wharfage, of one hundred dollars a year. Services have been regularly held here twice on each Lord's day, and on the principal holy days during the year. The average attendance has been about the same as at the Church on the East River—the proportion of seamen being, from the location, less than during the previous year. The Missionary, since entering upon his duties here in July, has baptized two adults, eleven children, married one couple, attended four funerals, and admitted seven to the communion. In addition to his other labors, he has held religious services at night in the forecastles of the New-York and Glasgow steamships, the details of which will be found in his report. There have been distributed at this Church and vicinity 120 Bibles, 100 Testaments, 87 Prayer-Books, a number of suitable volumes, with over 30,000 pages of Tracts.

The opportunity of preaching the Gospel, by the Missionary at Large, Rev. E. F. Remington, in the open air at Coenties Slip, to that class of men for whose especial benefit this Mission was instituted, is more favorable at this station than at either of the Churches. The hearers vary from 100 to 250, and here are gathered together such as probably never enter the house of God. Services have been held here regularly, with the exceptions stated in a previous part of this report. At the close of the services on the dock, the seamen are invited to the room near by, where an earnest address is frequently made and prayer offered, previous to distributing books and tracts to them. It has been found that this room affords increased facilities of intercourse between the Missionary and the members of the Board in attendance, and the seamen present. By reference to the report of the Missionary at Large, it will be seen there have been distributed here 375 Bibles, 255 Prayer-Books, 108,000 pages of

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Tracts, besides other volumes. He has baptized twenty-three children, attended four funerals. He has held seventy-eight services in the open air at Coenties Slip, with occasional services at sailor boarding-houses.

The new Sailors' Home, in Franklin Square, bids fair to realize all the expectations formed of it. The Board takes this occasion to commend the faithful and judicious management of the keeper, Mr. Marett, and his wife. About 800 seamen have entered the Home during the past year, a number of whom have been induced to deposit in the Seamen's Bank for Savings, or to send to their friends, between three and four thousand dollars. Sick and shipwrecked sailors have been provided for here, clothed, and in some instances furnished with the means of returning to their friends. In addition to daily family worship, an evening service is regularly held here on every Wednesday of the year, at which Rev. Mr. Waite has generally officiated, since his connection with the Mission. Bibles, Prayer-Books and Tracts are given by the keeper to the sailors on going to sea. Donations of books for distribution to the sailors, as well as additions to the Library here, and clothes for destitute seamen, would materially add to the benefit of this department of our operations. The extension of the Bowery to Franklin Square has caused an assessment on this property of \$900, which has been paid. The consequent lowering of the grade of the street will add largely to this expense, but the amount of which has not yet been ascertained.

By the Treasurer's Report it will be seen that the receipts for the past year have been \$9,120 49, and the ordinary expenditures \$8,362 24. The receipts to the "permanent fund" have been \$9,004 30; the expenditures from it \$5,862 25; leaving a balance in this fund of \$3,449 79; which, when sufficiently increased, may be appropriated by the Board to paying off the mortgage of \$7,000 now existing on the Home.

Among the many liberal bequests by the late Miss Ann Jay, of this city, to promote religious and benevolent objects, the welfare of the sailor, which was dear to her during her life, was not forgotten in her will. She bequeathed to this Society \$3,500, \$3,000 of which has been paid into the Treasury, \$500 being retained by her executor, according to the tenor of her will, to pay for certain religious books, to be selected and distributed under the directions of this Board.

We have likewise received information of another liberal bequest of \$1,000 by the late Miss Anna Kinsey, of Brooklyn.

The Board acknowledges, with gratitude, donations of books from the American Bible Society, the New-York Bible Society, the American Tract Society, the New-York Bible and Common Prayer-Book Society, the Society for the Promotion of Evangelical Knowledge, and the Protestant Episcopal Tract Society, and also from various individuals.

In reviewing the past, we find that thirteen years ago, with only one Missionary and one Chapel, our annual expenditure was somewhat less than \$2,000; at that period it was estimated that nearly 40,000 seamen visited this port annually. Since then we have attained the rank of the first commercial nation on the globe. The tonnage of our merchant service exceeds that of any other nation; our exports and imports, our internal trade and navigation, our productions and wealth, have very greatly increased, and mainly through the perilous toils of the seamen. Their number, now visiting our port, is very much greater than formerly, and consequently requires more extended provisions for their spiritual wants. Our widely extending internal navigation has brought to our city thousands of boatmen, who are dependant on the Bethels for the privileges of worship on the Sabbath. It is known that there are on every Lord's day thousands of seamen and boatmen in this great city, for whose attendance on Church services there is not adequate provision, and who are exposed to all the evils of Sabbath breaking, with their demoralizing effects. Yet it is, in a great degree, through the labors of these men, that our city has attained an eminence for commercial power, wealth and luxury, rivalling her of old, "whose merchants were princes and her trafficers the honorable of the earth." While the seamen are the means of our temporal prosperity, is it not just that their spiritual welfare should be the object of our

care; and are we not, in *respect to them*, imperatively called upon to follow the injunction of our Lord, "Freely ye have received, freely give !"

In order to sustain our present efforts, it will require an annual expenditure of some \$8,000, to be derived from subscriptions by individuals, the yearly grant by Trinity Church, and collections in the churches, in conformity with the Canon. While so many are made rich by the toils of the sailor, who is yet in no wise partaker of the enjoyments to which he ministers, may we not confidently look to the recipients of this wealth for the support of the Missionaries who care for his soul? The life of the sailor is brief; his privileges of worship, his means of grace are few; shall we withhold from him, during his brief life, these few privileges, these few opportunities? If we deny him blessings which we have power to bestow, shall we not be held guilty before Him who hath said, "Inasmuch as ye did it not unto one of the least of these, my brethren, ye did it not to me."

REPORT OF THE MISSIONARY

IN CHARGE OF THE

FLOATING CHURCH OF OUR SAVIOUR.

THE Missionary in charge of the Floating Church of our Saviour, in making his Thirteenth Annual Report to the Board of Managers of the Protestant Episcopal Church Missionary Society to Seamen in the City and Port of New-York, respectfully states:

That during the past year he has endeavored unremittingly to perform the pleasing duties of his station, by ministering at the Chapel and at their homes, here in the city, to the spiritual wants of the class of persons to whom the Society has directed their labors.

Though from year to year there may not always be presented remarkable cases of interest worthy to be detailed in his Annual Report, there have been, from time to time, exhibited in his Monthly Reports to the Board, such evidences of the immeasurable importance and usefulness of their labors, in support of his station, as to encourage the continuance of their efforts, and to gratify the anticipations of those generous donors, interested in seamen, who have assisted them in sustaining their labors.

The regular services at the Chapel have been on Sunday morning at half-past ten, and on Sunday afternoon at half-past three, in winter, and at three, in summer, with the Holy Communion on the first Sunday in each month. In this Missionary Chapel the sailor may feel he has a spiritual home, adapted to his peculiar circumstances, and a church and pastor, who would be with and administer to him and his family the ordinances of religion, in season and out of season. A large number of religious books have been given out as usual, on each Sunday afternoon, at the Chapel after Divine services, to sailors about to commence a new voyage, and also books have been put on board some of our public ships and merchantmen. Your Missionary, on several occasions, on a Sunday, has put into their hands at the chancel rail as many as fifty bound volumes, including Prayer-Books, Bibles and Testaments, and miscellaneous religious books, without mentioning the large number of religious Tracts he is constantly in the habit of giving away, in the English, French, Spanish, Portuguese, Dutch, Swedish, Italian, German and other languages, to seamen, as they are about to set sail.

These, for the most part, he has reason to think have been much read, and awakened trains of thought and feeling which, by the grace of God, has resulted, in some cases, in a thorough reformation of life. If, however, they have done no other good, being books embellished with illustrations, they have proved attractive, and in a measure taken the place of that ribald literature which once formed the staple of a sailor's reading while away from religious influences from home on the deep.

Though so many as from two to three thousand seamen are usually at one time in port, yet it is really melancholy to observe the large proportion of the number who, from various causes, are kept away from public worship. Those, however, who once get in a habit of attending, exhibit the kindly influences which are thus brought to bear upon them, and gladly embrace the opportunities they so seldom enjoy of attending in other ports, as well as our own, the religious teachings of Christ's ministers. The infrequency of the sailor's opportunities of hearing the words of eternal life must make every faithful messenger of the Cross feel the responsibility of his duties, and the necessity of making known, in the plainest language and the earnestness and simplicity of Gospel truth, the unsearchable riches of Christ: that when they go from our Chapel and are on shore at other ports, they inquire and seek for these precious opportunities, has often been manifest to your Missionary, by the kind messages of interest in our work which they bring with them on their return, from chaplains in other ports ; and often does he thus enjoy renewed occasions to strengthen and

confirm the seeker of grace in the privileges and ways of the Christian life.

Your Missionary has baptized, during the last year, 67 persons, married 21 couples, attended 11 funerals, admitted to the Communion 9, and put into the hands of seamen, 1,400 miscellaneous religious books; such as "The Pilgrim's Progress," "The Life of John Newton," "Baxter's Call," "The Seamen's and Boatmen's Manual," "The Sailor's Manual of Devotion," "God Speaking by Facts," "The Cabin-Boy's Locker," "The Convict Ship," Doddridge's Rise and Progress," &c., &c.

He has, besides, personally delivered to sailors 105 Bibles—some of these in foreign languages—165 Testaments, about 108 Prayer-Books, and 23,000 pages of religious Tracts. For these he has been largely indebted to the American Tract Society, the New-York Bible and Common Prayer-Book Society, the New-York Bible Society, the Society for the Promotion of Evangelical Knowledge, the Society of Friends, and to liberal aid from the Rector of St. George's Church, in this city, and other sources. All of these have most cheerfully met his applications with kindness and generous liberality, and seemed glad of an opportunity of giving to seamen books adapted to their education, and conducive to their spiritual good. REPORT OF THE MISSIONARY

IN CHARGE OF THE

FLOATING CHURCH OF THE HOLY COMFORTER.

THE Missionary in charge of the Floating Church of the Holy Conforter, in making this, his first Annual Report, (8th of the Mission,) would state, that he entered upon the duties of the station on the 20th of July last, it being the ninth Sunday after Trinity.

He was induced to listen to the call the Board of Managers were pleased to make him, from a belief that the knowledge which he possessed of the character of seamen would, by the blessing of God, render him useful in such field of effort. It was, however, with great diffidence and submissive prayer he directly identified himself with the operation. Sensibly realizing the prime importance of the mission, and aware that difficulties of a peculiarly trying nature were to be encountered and overcome, he threw himself upon the arm of God and began his labor, trusting in the revealed assurance, that strength and succor would be granted according to the day and trial. How far he has been successful in winning souls to Christ, is a matter which can only be truly known at the great assize, when sea and land shall mutually give up their dead, and the secrets of all hearts stand revealed.

The statistics incorporated in this report are merely indices of the real work. Owing to the wandering character of those to whom he ministers, hundreds come under the influence of the Missionary but once; they pass beyond his after-reach, and are seen by him no more. To each and all some word, with special reference to the soul's interest, has been spoken: the bread cast upon the waters floats, whither we know not; confident we are, however, that no crumb is lost, seeing that He who holds the deep in the hollow of His hand, guards the deposit. It is a cheering thought, to one engaged in a work like this, that the Great Missionary, the Lord Jesus, not only loved the adventurous men of the sea, but consorted with them, preaching from their boats, and making the very element upon which they earned their livelihood the vehicle of his sublime wonders. Why, the very fact that Christ selected a third part of His twelve disciples from one class, and that boatmen or fishermen, is not only evidence of His interest in seamen, but indicative that the class, as such, possesses high interests, which the Christian Church is bound to look after; and that whosoever engages in the undertaking of doing good in such relation, relying upon the Divine Spirit to bless the endeavor, shall not labor in vain.

In addition to the duties of the Sabbath, and those of the principal holy days, when the Chapel, considering its location, has been well attended, your Missionary has occasionally held religious services in the forecastles of the Glasgow and New-York steamers. On the occasions of his visiting the vessels, the greater portion of the respective crews were present, and entered with apparent interest in the solemn services. Great encouragement has been afforded, too, by the questions which the seamen have asked at the conclusion of the exercises, showing, by subduedness of manner as well as by the character of the inquiry, that they were alive to the importance of religion as a vitalizing element, and aware that their eternal happiness depended on personal decision.

The distribution of Bibles, Prayer-Books and Tracts, at the close of the afternoon service at the Chapel, is accompanied with remarks, which receive the utmost attention from those to whom they are addressed. It is a thing of common occurrence for seamen, after receiving books and listening to the accompanying instruction, to give the hand of the Missionary an earnest grasp, with the ejaculation, "God bless you!" And on one occasion a seaman left with the grasp a two dollar bill for the poor—an instance of liberality worthy of remark—because it shows, that with all their faults, sailors are men of generous impulses, of lofty moral courage, and forward in the cause of virtue, when brought under the influence of Truth. Books are taken by seamen and boatmen from the Library, and though in some instances lost, yet oftener returned with evidence that they have been read.

On Wednesday evenings, the Missionary holds religious exercises at the Home in Franklin Square; and it affords him pleasure to report the readiness with which the inmates assemble at the sound of the bell in the room, and the attention they give to the reading of the Word, and its plain and familiar exposition. In prayer and singing the larger part present unite with audible voice. The institution is evidently productive of great good; in fact, it is a feature all-important to an efficient Seamen's Mission.

A great part of your Missionary's time, during the week, is taken up in visiting the docks and shipping north and south of the Chapel, distributing Tracts, and speaking timely words to all who are in a position to listen, and with an ear to hear.

Since entering upon the duties of the charge, the Missionary has baptized 2 adults and 11 children; admitted 7 to the communion; married 1 couple; attended four funerals. He has distributed at the Chapel and abroad, 100 Testaments, 120 Bibles, 87 Prayer-Books, and a number of suitable volumes, with over 30,000 pages of Tracts. He has also visited many sick and poor, supplying the needy with necessaries, paying, in some instances, the house rent and giving money. Ninety dollars have been distributed—part of which was taken up at the offertory, part collected in the box at the door, and the balance by two benevolent individuals, one giving \$5 and the other \$20.

For the supply of Books and Tracts your Missionary is indebted, in one instance, to a religious lady, who sent him, through Mr. Stanford, \$10 worth of valuable works, and to the American Bible Society, New-York Bible Society, the New-York Bible and Common Prayer-Book Society, the Protestant Episcopal Tract Society, and the Society for the Promotion of Evangelical Knowledge. He would mention, with gratitude, the alacrity with which the respective Societies complied with his requests. J. M. WAITE.

REPORT OF THE MISSIONARY AT LARGE.

THE Missionary at Large of the Protestant Episcopal Church Missionary Society for Seamen in the City and Port of New-York, in making his fifth Annual Report, would state, that he has distributed to sailors, in their boarding-houses and on ship-board, 107,936 pages of Tracts, 255 Prayer-Books, 100 Testaments and 375 Bibles. He has baptized 23 children, attended 4 funerals and held 78 services in the open air in Coenties Slip. He has also occasionally held services in the new Sailors' Home, Franklin Square, and in the Sailors' boarding-house, 322 Pearl-street, the past year. During the five years last past the writer has been holding open air services and preaching in the streets of New-York twice every Sunday, unless prevented by sickness or the inclemency of the weather. That he has suffered much from rheumatism, neuralgia, sore throat and other diseases, is true. That he has been uncomfortable, when preaching in mid-winter, with his hands and feet benumbed with cold, or when standing on hot paving stones, the thermometer 98 in the shade, is also true. That there has been joy on earth, and, as he believes, joy in heaven over the sinner that repenteth; that hundreds have attended these services who were never within the walls of an earthly sanctuary; that thousands have listened to the words of eternal life, who have been deprived of the "means of grace" for many long years, are also among the verities of the past, the results of which eternity alone can unfold.

Your Missionary has received donations of Tracts, Bibles, Prayer-Books, and other religious books from the Bible and Common Prayer-Book Society, the American Bible Society, the American Tract Society, and from the Rev. Dr. Tyng, five hundred bound volumes of Dr. Cheever's great work, "A Voyage to the Celestial Country." The writer's gratitude for this assistance in his Mission will be known in that day when the secrets of all hearts are disclosed. E. F. REMINGTON.
