It was a cold & raw windy disagreeable blustering day. There was much motion up the Chapel. The fires were puffed out by gusts of wind. The temperature of the atmosphere in the Church particularly cold and disagreeable from gas from the stoves and wind from without while no fire could be maintained. Added to which the ^{strong} North wind had blown half the water out of the bay & the church at low tide was at least 3 feet lower than usual.

I operated all day and preached to a pretty good congregation of about 75 sailors and as many others on the text With the heart man believeth unto righteousness and with the mouth confession is made unto salvation.

Wm. had much bruised who confessed to me that he came to Church on purpose to sign the temperance pledge, though he feared there was not much hope for him before God. He had been nearly shipwrecked in a bad gale in the Bark Propang off Cape Hatteras in his last voyage 3 weeks ago & was lying out 9 weeks & had endeavored to drown himself some time with him.

To show him all sin and unrighteousness might be forgiven to the penitent. He signed the pledge and then Capt. Hoxie

and penitents from Capt. Wm. Hoxie formerly of late ship of the Bay many have been at sea 3 months since
