At the request of the Chairman, the Superintendent then withdrew from the meeting. Mr. Michalis reported to the Board the result of an interview with Dr. Conrad Berens, the surgeon who would shortly perform the operation upon Dr. Mansfield's eyes, and that Dr. Berens had very generously offered to make no charge for the operation, his services to be considered a contribution to the work of the Institute. Mr. Michalis stated however, that the hospital expenses and those incident to conval-escence would be substantial, and he called the attention of the Board to the extremely valuable services rendered
