cation to Boston on account of the death  
of my wife's Mother Mrs Mary Ewing who  
ceased breathing at 3 o'clock in the afternoon  
and I took the cars for Boston Jan 20, 1852 at  
8 o'clock in the morning and reached 158  
Fremont St the home of the deceased at  
1/2 past 7 o'clock in the eve the cars having  
been detained by the deep snow that fell  
on Sunday, Jan 18, 1852. to the depth of over  
one foot & the <sup>severe</sup> cold setting in this day  
which last 5 days.

I engaged Rev James Millet to supply  
my place at the Floating Ct for a service  
He sent in the morning Rev Mr Dixon  
an English clergyman who reached the chapel  
after the congregation was dismissed by Mr

Jan 25/52

George S. Parker under the supposition that there was to be a failure <sup>on the part</sup> of the expected ~~the~~ clergyman. Two minutes after the congregation began to retire, he arrived and they were called back and excepting 8 or nine persons all returned and the morning prayer & sermon were ~~attended~~ <sup>delivered</sup> by him.

In the afternoon Revd James Miller officiated - and gave out books to about 150 learners. There was a good congregation about 170 persons.

In the morning <sup>Bookm</sup> up to day I attended St Pauls Church in Boston with the members of her family & sat in the family pew with them. In the afternoon I officiated at Trinity Church <sup>(the Church of my father)</sup> Boston, and preached on the text

Tuesday, July 17, 1852, At 1 o'clock today  
after spending nearly all day yesterday  
with the family in making arrangements  
for his funeral and place of burial, I  
attended the funeral of William Tate  
1st Lt <sup>late</sup> 34<sup>th</sup> Regt of Bank Carolina hence  
to Charleston in Surger & Blewman's line  
of Packets who died 1/2 an hour after I

In the morning I officiated & preached  
to a very large congregation of Seamen  
on the text. This is a faithful saying  
If we live with him we shall reign

In the afternoon arrangements  
having been made by myself yesterday  
at the request of Adm<sup>r</sup> Ho. owner  
of the Ship N. B. Palmer which arrived  
at this port in 80 days from Canton on  
Friday April 2, 1852. on board of which  
a Chinese Sailor named Atong Net 23  
parname of Chin Chor - was killed  
by falling from the main top Cross trees  
2 hours after reaching her dock port of Dover St

April 4 / 52 Funeral of a Chinese Sailor

For the funeral of the deceased, our services were somewhat changed. At 2 P.M. I walked in procession in my surplice, scarf & black cloak from the front of the Chapel where two hundred sailors had assembled & preceded to the ship with a hearse drawn by two horses, at the foot of Dover St. There we received the body, and walked back to the Church in procession, the corpse being immediately preceded by the mate & 20 mate of the ship and nine Chinese sailors, <sup>also</sup> myself... who were shipmates of Atong, on board the S. B. Palmer. where we arrived at 10 minutes past 3 o'clock. The organ, played by Mr. G. S. Parker, in absence of the organist, performed a service while the corpse preceded by myself entered the Church.

We were followed by the nine Chinese  
Shipmates of the deceased, and 300 Sailors  
from New York who were soon placed  
in appropriate seats. I then began  
I read through the Eup Prayer. taking  
the 15 C of 1st of Corinthians for the lesson  
and the Chorus glorifying - Lord let  
me know my end &c. in our burial service  
After singing I then preached a  
sermon to the assembled congregation  
amounting to near 400 persons. on the  
text. My life is in my hand, yet I forget  
not thy law

I prefaced the sermon & left by stating  
the age & place of residence of Atong & the  
manner of his death. He volunteered to go

His foot slipped while he was 100 feet from

to America.

The nine China men sat in the front seats  
in the Chapel. The corpse was laid  
before the Channel in the middle  
aisle. On the plate of the Coffin  
was engraved the age of the deceased  
his place of residence & manner  
of death, both in English & also  
in Chinese Characters.

After the sermon the body was taken  
on the shore to Greenwood Cemetery  
& there put into the necessary vault.
